Why Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, derives its name from the ancient practice of marking the foreheads of worshipers with ashes from the unused palm branches of the previous year. Ashes historically have had a dual significance.

First, they are Old Testament symbols of sadness and humility. Job, in the midst of all his troubles, cried out to God from the ash heap.

The second symbolic meaning of ashes is as a reminder of our mortality. Each of us faces the inevitability of physical death. Our bodies and material possessions eventually will turn to dust and ashes. This is a reminder that we dare not trust in things that crumble. But Lent does not leave us on the ash heap. It begins with Ash Wednesday, but ends with Easter. And Easter proclaims that, through Christ, God resurrects us from our dust and ashes, makes us new creatures and brings life out of death!

"I am the Lord your God", what an assurance of being personally loved by the great "I AM". But then look at the next verse - have no other gods before me.! As humans we know we are selfish and the root of selfishness is "I" which translates to worshipping ourselves rather than God. We are not truthful if we say "God is first and I am in second place". We do have an unsurpassed example of a man who had no other "gods" – Jesus. "Remarkably, even Jesus Christ could not live the Christian life by His own power and initiative" (1)

Every year we "walk" with him in the scriptures as he meets challenges that would have caused us to hide from sight, not so with Jesus! He remained faithful to his Father's will no matter the consequences because he knew God's great love for him and for his children.

This is love: not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. 1 John 4:10

Our celebration at Easter happens because God's promise of a Savior has been completed and eternal life has been made possible. 24 Very truly I tell you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life and will not be judged but has crossed over from death to life. John 5:24

O God, our Redeemer and Creator, help us to determine the "gods" in our lives, to rid ourselves of these "gods", and to submit our will to your will. Amen.
